When you develop your argument, you are confirming your own position, building your case. Use empirical evidence—facts and statistics—to support your claims. Appeal to your audience's rational and logical thinking. Argue your case from the authority of your evidence and research. WRTG - Develop Your Argument Another way to think about how to develop an argument is to remember what made you believe or consider your central idea in the first place. Since you thought it was a sufficiently reasonable or

interesting claim to consider, you probably had a reason for thinking so. Makes an argumentative assertion about a topic; it states the conclusions that you have reached about your topic. Makes a promise to the reader about the scope, purpose, and direction of your paper. Is focused and specific enough to be "proven" within the boundaries of your paper. Developing a thesis statement - The Writing Center - UW ... These types of question want a discussion in the form of an academic argument. An argument can be broken down into 'statements' and 'conclusions from statements'. 'That guy's soaking' is a statement, whereas 'It must be raining' is a conclusion based on that statement. Developing a critical argument - University of East London ... If you are considering a range of opinions, try to group them together under different headings.
